

Mr. L.W., a retired merchant, died of heart failure at age 67 when Mars reached the Semi-square of the Sun's horoscopolical place. He was born at 12 a.m. November 16th, 1837, when the Sun was 24 degrees from Mars.

If we took no account of the new aspects we should not be able to account for the abilities of many distinguished people.

Cardinal Newman was born February 21st, 1801. Mercury was in quartile aspect to Mars, but was 108 degrees from Neptune (which is the Bi-Septile) and 162 degrees from Saturn (which is the Tri-Septile).

Lecky was born March 26th, 1838. He wrote a history of the Rise and Spirit of Rationalism in Europe. Rationalism can only be defined as pure reason, and reason is the faculty of intelligence which enables a man to arrive at the truth. We could not account for the great ability of Lecky if we took no notice of the new aspects, for Mercury was conjoined with Mars and in trine to Saturn, aspects insufficient by themselves to account for Lecky's great reasoning powers; but Mercury was 160 degrees from Jupiter (which is the Tri-Septile) and Mercury was 52 degrees from Neptune (which is the Septile aspect).

If the published horoscope (8.10 a.m. December 29th, 1809, Liverpool) of Mr. Gladstone is correct and has any authority Mercury in the ascendant would confer upon him a good deal of ability; but Mercury in the ascendant in Sextile to Uranus is insufficient to account for his great oratorical powers unless we consider the Semi-quintile of Mercury to Venus, even though Mercury was in Semi-sextile to Neptune and Saturn.

We have invariably found similar aspects in the horoscopes of children to those found in the horoscopes of parents; that is to say when a parent has Mercury in good aspect to Venus we have invariably found that Venus forms a good aspect to Mercury in the horoscope of the child. We should expect, therefore, to find a good aspect of Mercury and Venus in the horoscope of Viscount Gladstone, who was born January 7th, 1854, and such is the fact, for Mercury is in Sextile to Venus and in Quintile to Neptune. Viscount Gladstone, therefore, has inherited much of the ability of his father though he is less loquacious. It will be observed that the Sun is in trine aspect to Saturn and in conjunction with Jupiter, and on his appointment to the Governor

Generalship of South Africa the Sun is in sextile to Jupiter and in Quintile to Saturn, Promissors of advancement. It will also be observed in the Star Courses on his appointment that the Sun is conjoined with Neptune and opposed to Mars; but they are Promissors of good fortune at birth seeing that the Sun was in trine to Mars and in Septile to Neptune. Consequently these bad Star Courses of good Promissors will prove inoperative. We have found that such is the fact in a thousand horoscopes.

We have frequently observed that good aspects of Neptune to Mercury confer either artistic or musical ability, and we should not be able to account for the ability of Jullien, (April 23rd, 1812,) the composer, if we took no notice of the efficacy of the Tri-septile of Mercury to Neptune, since Mercury was afflicted both by Saturn and Uranus and formed no good aspect to Venus.

Richard Bethell (afterwards created first Lord Westbury) born June 30th, 1800, a jurist and Statesman, had Mercury in quartile aspect to Mars, but in Sextile to Uranus and in trine to Neptune, Mercury was 9 degrees from Jupiter. The aspect of Mercury to Neptune undoubtedly contributed largely to his ability. The Sun was conjoined with Jupiter, in Trine to Neptune, in Semi-sextile to Saturn and conjoined with Venus. His promotion to Attorney General and to the Lord Chancellorship coincided with the good aspects of the Sun to the Promissors Venus, Saturn and Jupiter. He was Lord Chancellor from 1861 to 1865 when the Sun was in Semi-sextile to Saturn, Sextile to Jupiter, Sextile to Neptune and conjoined with Venus. He died in 1873 when Mars the Promissor had reached the Semi-quartile of the Sun in the radical horoscope.

We should not be able to perceive the great energy, keenness of intellect and artistic ability of that gifted painter Alfred Rethel, who excelled in the painting of historical subjects and who was born May 15th, 1816, if we took no heed of the Semi-quintile of Mercury to Mars, even though Venus was in Quintile to Mars and Mercury was in Trine to Jupiter and Venus in Semi-sextile to Mercury. The Sun was in quartile aspect to Saturn, in Semi-square to Mars and he died on December 1st, 1859, when the Sun was 132 degrees from Saturn; i.e. within orb the Sesquiquadrate.

The Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour was born July 25th, 1848. He informs us that he is unaware at what time his nativity occurred.

He has Mercury in Trine to Saturn and Mercury is 9 degrees removed from Jupiter. We should be quite unable to perceive his great philosophic ability, however, did we neglect to consider the Bi-quintile of Mercury to Neptune and the conjunction of Mercury and Jupiter (which appears to be operative within 9 degrees), for we have observed that conjunctions of so long an orb as 9 degrees of Mercury and Jupiter have been found in the horoscopes of men of undeniable ability.

Note.

Richard Cobden was born June 3rd, 1804, when Mercury was in trine to Jupiter and 112 degrees from Uranus. The aspect of Mercury to Jupiter would indicate his great ability; but the factor for his originality must be the aspect of Mercury to Uranus which necessitates an orb of 8 degrees, for Mercury was also in Semi-square to Mars and in Square to Saturn, and he was a master of invective and often accused his political opponents of unscrupulous conduct. Men, however, who have good aspects of Mercury to Jupiter and Uranus are not men of wisdom if Mercury is found to be afflicted by Mars and Saturn. Such men are generally half philosopher and half fanatic. The Moon was in Sextile to the Sun and Cobden made a lot of money in business.

We could not point to the great mental energy of Professor Ludwig Feuerbach, who was born at 1-35 a.m. July 28th, 1804. Bavaria if we took no notice of the Septile aspect of Mercury to Mars, for Mercury was in Sextile to Saturn, Square to Jupiter and Quintile to Uranus—aspects insufficient to account for his great devotion to literature. Moreover, from 1841 to 1845 when he wrote his chief works Mercury was in Trine aspect to Mars and conjoined with Uranus, both Promittors. It will be observed that Mercury is almost 15 degrees from Venus (which is the Semi-demi-sextile) and Mercury was in Sextile to Venus in 1841 when he wrote one of his great works. We have no doubt, therefore, that the Semi-demi-sextile aspect is influential as well as the Semi-demi-quintile. Though Feuerbach's works brought him fame he lived more or less in abject poverty; even though the Moon was in trine aspect to the Sun the Moon was badly afflicted by Saturn and Uranus. From a pecuniary point of view Feuerbach would have been more successful in business. He was, however, the son of an eminent German jurist, namely P. J. A. von Feuerbach, consequently he inherited superior abilities. Those who follow our method of interpreting the subsequent aspects of Promittors will not be surprised when they find that Professor Feuerbach

produced two remarkable books when Mercury came to the Trine aspect of the Promittor Mars and the conjunction of the Promittor Uranus, and that he produced nothing of an important nature during the years 1845 to 1875 when Mercury formed no aspects to Promittors; but observe that Mercury turned retrograde when Feuerbach reached the age of 59 and again formed the conjunction of Uranus and the Trine with Mars, when he again produced a work of extraordinary importance. It will be found that when man's performances coincide with the good aspects of Promittors the work is superior to that performed at other periods when there are no good aspects of Promittors. The man of letters, therefore, the composer, the painter should let his efforts coincide with good aspects of Promittors. The Statesman should have the good aspects of the Promittors Uranus, Jupiter and Venus; whilst the soldier should have the good aspects of the Promittor Mars. The good aspects of the Promittors to Mercury are essential to the success of the literary man, and if the Promittors are angular (especially in the 10th House or Ascendant) the greater the success and the more extensive the fame.

Observe the quartile aspect of Venus to Mars in the horoscope of George Sand who was born near midnight, July 5th, 1804, at Paris. (The nativity occurred probably about 11-30 p.m. according to a French biography, the name of which we cannot at this moment remember). Read the account of her many love intrigues and her notorious licentious conduct. But observe that Mercury was in Sextile to Venus, in Trine to Jupiter, in Semisextile to Mars and in Tri-septile to Neptune; but Mercury was in quartile aspect to Saturn. She wrote a large number of books and quite distinguished people wept at her death; they said the world had lost a great writer. She wrote works in 1832, 1833, 1834, 1836, 1842, 1846, 1848, 1853, 1855, 1858, 1859, 1860, 1864, 1869, 1872 and all through these years there were constant recurring aspects of the Promittors Mars, Venus and Jupiter to Mercury. Some of her publications coincided with the Septile aspect of Mercury to Jupiter, which proves how powerfully influential this aspect is. She found herself famous in 1831 when Mercury was in Sextile to Mars, conjunction Venus and in Quintile to Jupiter, and alas! all this fine constructive thought, the result of creative effort and energy, is all marred by the result, of the cross aspect of Venus to Mars. Her marriage of course

was an unhappy one and doubtless had much to do with her indiscretions. It is a pity that such fine literary work should be marred by that looseness in morals which makes parents forbid their daughters to read her books. Her best work is in her novels, especially those which appeared from 1832 to 1848, and her incessant energy was tremendous. So great was her ability that she had no difficulty in dramatising one of her novels.

We should not be able to account for the ability of Berlioz to compose music if we failed to consider the Semi-demi-quintile of Mercury to Venus and the Semi-demi-sextile of Venus to Mars. He was born at 11 a.m. December 11th, 1803, Isere Dept. France.

The astrologer could not indicate the agency for the ability of Sir Isaac Newton (who was born between 1 and 2 a.m. December 25th old style, 1642) if he neglected to consider the Semi-demi-quintile of Mercury and Neptune and the Semi-quintile of Mercury and Uranus, aspects which account for his great originality and research, for though Mercury in Sextile to Venus conferred great ability Mercury was in square to Saturn, in square to Jupiter and in Sesqui-quadrate to Mars.

The great mental energy, sharpness of intellect and ability of Mrs. Besant would puzzle us if we took no notice of the Tri-septile aspect of Mercury to Mars and the Bi-quintile of Mercury to Saturn, for Mercury conjunction Venus accounts only for her great eloquence and literary ability. She was born about Sunset, October 1st, 1847.

John Roebuck (a Radical Politician and Member of Parliament) was born on December 29th, 1802, and there would be no factor for Roebuck's abilities if we attributed no virtue to the Bi-septile aspect of Mercury to Saturn and neglected to include the conjunction of Mercury with Venus, though they are 9 degrees apart, for Mercury was afflicted by Mars, Jupiter and Uranus.

The Duc de Morny, the illegitimate son of Comte de Flahout and Queen Hortense, half brother of Napoleon, was born October 23rd, 1811, and he was a great conspirator. The Sun was in Quartile aspect to Mars and so was Mercury; but the Sun was conjoined with Venus and in trine to Jupiter. He was the leading conspirator in the Coup d'état of December, 1851, when the Sun reached the Tri-septile of Jupiter, and he filled the posts of Minister and Ambassador in 1856 and 1857 when the Sun

completed the Tri-septile aspect to the Promittor Jupiter. At the Coup d'état the Sun was conjoined with Neptune, and as the Sun was 40 degrees from Neptune at birth this is evidence that the Semi-square is operative from 40 degrees.

We should not be able to perceive the ability of Pierre Proudhon, the French Socialist, who was born July 15th, 1809, (for he was the son of very poor parents and he studied with such persistent effort that he was able to obtain a pension from the Academy,) without taking into account the Semi-quintile of Mercury to Venus and the Septile of Mercury to Jupiter; though Mercury was in Sextile to Saturn and in Quintile to Uranus it was in square to Mars. The Sun was in Sesqui-quadrate to Neptune and in quartile aspect to Mars, but in septile to Jupiter and in Quintile to Uranus, in Sextile to Saturn. He was elected to the Assembly in 1848, when the Sun was in Trine to the Promittor Uranus; but in 1849 when the Sun reached the Sesqui-quadrate of Mars and the conjunction of Neptune he was imprisoned and kept in prison till 1852. In 1858 when Mars came to the Quartile aspect of the Sun in the radix and the Sun to the conjunction of Jupiter he fled to Belgium to escape imprisonment; the good aspect of the Promittor Jupiter enabled him to escape. But in 1865 he wrote some books on Socialism when Mercury was in Trine to Uranus, Sextile to Venus and in conjunction with Jupiter, which proves that the Septile aspect of Mercury to Jupiter and the Semi-quintile aspect of Mercury to Venus were influential at birth.

We should not be able to account for the great success of Wallenstein unless we admit that Mars being 28 degrees from the Sun is in Semi-sextile to the Sun.

A pilot born at 4 p.m. December 2nd, 1869, piloted a ship on to the Goodwin Sands and she was lost in 1909. There is no agency for this except the Sesqui-quadrate of the Sun to Uranus, the Sun was 139 degrees from Uranus at birth. At the time of the disaster the Sun was opposed to Uranus the Promittor.

L. Stowacki born at 7 a.m. September 4th, (new style), 1801, Poland, was a very clever Russian scholar. He wrote many books dramas, epics and lyrics. Mercury was in Sextile to Venus, in Sextile to Mars, in Quintile to Neptune, Bi-quintile to Jupiter, Sextile to Saturn. The Sun was in good aspect to Uranus and

Mars, but in cross aspect to Neptune. The remarkable productions of his pen coincided with the good aspects of the Promittors to Mercury ; but he died when the Sun reached the Semi-square of the Promittor Neptune.

Mr. R. C. was born at 2-35 a.m., May 15th, 1850. The Sun was in Sextile to Mars, the Moon was in Sextile to Jupiter, but in square to Saturn and in Semi-square to the Sun ; Mercury was in conjunction with Venus and in Sextile to Saturn. He has of course good abilities and they have stood him in good stead, for they have proved a valuable asset ; but these are insufficient to account for his extraordinary good fortune unless we recognise the potency of the Semi-quintile of the Sun to Saturn, the Semi-demi-quintile of the Sun to Venus. At age 27 when Mr. R.C. purchased a business which subsequently proved very remunerative we find that the Sun was in Sextile to Saturn (the Promissor of good fortune) and in parallel to Venus in the radix, and Mercury was in Sextile to Saturn and in Sextile to Venus, which promised him success in his new venture.

We are quite satisfied that the Quartile aspect of the Sun to the major planets is operative at so wide an orb as 11 degrees. The Czarewitch was born at 9-30 p.m., February 18th (old style) 1690, St. Petersburg, and was put to death by order of his father at age 28. He had the Sun in the 5th House, 79 degrees from Mars which occupied the 8th House.

The Right Hon. Lloyd George, the Chancellor of the Exchequer and the author of the revolutionary Budget proposals of 1909-1910 was born on the 17th January, 1863. We are unaware of the time of birth. Mercury was in Trine to Saturn, conjoined with Venus and in Trine to Uranus; but Mercury was in Bi-Septile aspect to Jupiter. There is no doubt that the length of orb of the conjunction of Venus and the Sun is almost if not quite 10 degrees, for Venus was 9 degrees removed from the conjunction of the Sun at the birth of Lloyd George. He was made President of the Board of Trade when Venus was in Sextile to the Sun in 1906, and the Sun was in Semi-quintile to Venus in the radix when he was made Chancellor of the Exchequer in 1908. It will be observed that the Sun was in quartile aspect to Mars and 130 degrees from Uranus. When Lloyd George, therefore, reaches the age of 49 the Sun will be in quartile aspect to Uranus and in Semi-square to Mars, both Promissors of

disaster. As we have not access to his birth time we cannot define the nature of the disaster; but his Government is almost sure to be defeated. As the good influence of Venus wanes from 1910 onwards and as the Malefic influence gets stronger so will Lloyd George's power recede and he will lose his position. We have invariably found that under the Star Courses of evil Promittors (especially of Mars) people act unwisely, often aggressively. There is a tendency to go to extremes.

Sir Beerbohm Tree (the Actor Manager) was born December 17th, 1853. Mercury was in good aspect to Venus and Jupiter and he met with a good deal of bad fortune from age 40 to 44 whilst the Sun was in square to the Promittor Uranus; but at age 45 when the Sun got clear of the adverse influence of Uranus and reached the Semi-sextile of the Promitter Jupiter (Venus at the same time reached the Quintile of Mercury in the radix) Mr. Tree produced Julius Ceasar and immediately met with tremendous success which replenished his already depleted coffers. He also met with a good deal of success from 1902 to 1904 under the good aspects of Venus and Jupiter to Mercury and the Sun. Mr. Tree reaches the topmost rung of the ladder of success from ages 65 to 69 under the good aspects of the Promittors Jupiter and Venus to Mercury; but as Mercury will be opposed to Mars he will not escape some aggressive fortune.

Sir Hiram E. Maxim, the inventor of the automatic system of firearms, was born February 5th, 1840. Mercury was in Semi-square to Saturn and Uranus, but 34 degrees from Mars (Semi-quintile), 28 degrees from Venus (Semi-sextile) and 75 degrees from Jupiter (Quintile). Our distances of orbs of the aspects must be very nearly correct, otherwise we should be puzzled to account for Sir Hiram Maxim's constructive ability.

Those who have Mercury in their horoscopes afflicted by the Malefics, but in good aspect to the Benefics need not be discouraged. Many great men have had Mercury afflicted by Saturn and have achieved great things with the aid of the Benefic Promittors. As an example showing the impotence of Saturn to dull a bright intellect, we instance the case of Sir William Crooks, the Editor of the Quarterly Journal of Science. He was born June 17th, 1832. Mercury was in quartile aspect to Saturn and in Sesqui-quadrante to Neptune. But the planet of intellect was nine degrees short of the Trine with Uranus and in Sextile to Mars, in Quintile to

Jupiter and in conjunction with Venus. This noted chemist discovered Thallium in 1861 when Mercury was in Trine aspect to the Promittor Mars, and he invented the Radiometer in 1874 when Mars was in Semi-sextile to Mercury's place at birth and Mercury was B.Q. Mars in the horoscope; Venus was in Sextile to Mercury's radical place.

The late Earl Percy died at the age of 38. He was born January 21st, 1871. At his birth the Sun was opposed to Uranus, in trine to Mars and conjoined with Mercury, also in sesquiquadrate to Jupiter; but the Sun was 27 degrees from Saturn. 38 days after birth, which corresponds with his 38th year, we find the Sun has reached the Sesqui-quadrate of Uranus; but this adverse aspect of a Promittor was insufficient to cause his death, but Saturn had arrived at the same moment at the semi-demi-quartile of the Sun's place in the radix. Saturn, in fact, had progressed to within 22 degrees of the Sun's place. We should think it not improbable that Earl Percy inherited no great strength of constitution.

The Czar of Russia, Nicholas II, was born at noon, May 18th, 1868, St. Petersburg. The Sun was in Semi-quartile aspect to Uranus and Neptune and opposed to Saturn at birth. When the Sun reached 26 degrees from Uranus (which is the semi-demi-quartile aspect) the Czar was attacked by a fanatic with a knife whilst travelling in Japan; but as the Sun was also within orb the Sextile aspect of Jupiter this Benefic warded off the adverse influence; the Sun was in good aspect to the Promittor Jupiter at birth.

We find these aspects become operative before they are complete; that is to say when the Sun has approached to within three degrees of say a square of Saturn, the adverse influence of Saturn begins to be operative and the evil influence becomes more powerful as the Sun approaches the completion of the aspect. These remarks are applicable to all aspects of the Luminaries to Promissors and to all other Promissors, such as Star Courses of the Planets among themselves, especially Mercury and Venus to the other planets.

The student should send for the book *Chaldean Astrology*, price 7/10 post free, which contains lessons on how to compute and interpret Star Courses. The author supplies ephemerides

for any year for 1/- and the ephemeris contains the Tables of Houses for casting Horoscopes.

CHAPTER XVI.

How defects of Character blast one's Career.

If the child has inherited a good quality of brains and the horoscope reveals good aspects to Mercury from Jupiter and Venus, then the child will display quite superior abilities and if Mercury also receives good aspects from Uranus and Neptune then it may display genius. The best aspects are those from Jupiter and Venus, then Mars, Neptune and Uranus. Saturn's good aspects to Mercury do not appear so efficacious in producing good mental gifts as the other planets. A mixture of good and bad aspects will produce ability; but the person will be erratic, for cross aspects produce ill-directed efforts, and yet if Mercury has the good aspect of Jupiter or Venus he will display much talent. The cleverest people are those who have Mercury in good aspect to Jupiter and Venus, and those who display extreme sharpness of wit are those who have Mercury in good aspect to Mars; it is the aspect of mental energy, precision and penetration. The good aspects of Jupiter to Mercury add great reasoning powers. The receptive and reflective faculties are great and the mind is philosophical if Mercury or Jupiter is in the ascendant and in good aspect to each other; such a position is a sure indication of literary ability.

Probity and uprightness of character are essentials, for very many gifted people bring about their downfall or forfeit their reputation by discreditable acts. We have observed many sudden descents from power of talented people through misconduct.

A man even under propitious Star Courses may wreck his career by unlawful acts. It is necessary, therefore, to carefully analyse the character and try and find out how a person is likely to act. It is indispensable to see if a man is likely to injure his own fortunes by some indiscretion, or unscrupulous conduct. It is essential to ascertain in fact, if a man is likely to succumb to temptations and to warn him of the consequences to his fortunes. We have observed that those who have an adverse aspect of Venus to Saturn are sometimes rather lax in their morals if either

Saturn or Venus are in the ascendant, for the ascendant represents personal acts. When either Saturn, Venus or Mars are in the ascendant and in cross aspect with each other the person may not be well conducted, he is deficient in moral philosophy; he is susceptible to temptations. We will instance two cases where moral failings have brought disaster; but we have found many other instances amongst less distinguished people.

Sir Charles Dilke was born September 4th, 1843 (we do not know the time at which his nativity occurred, but possibly Venus and the Sun were rising in the 1st House or ascendant). Mercury was in Semi-sextile to Venus, the Sun was conjoined with Venus, the Sun was in Trine to Saturn and was also 158 degrees from Neptune, 159 degrees from Jupiter and 160 degrees from Uranus; Venus was in sesqui-quadrate to Saturn. He was made under-secretary in 1880 when the Sun was in Trine to Jupiter and Trine to Neptune which proves the power of the new aspects of 158 to 165 degrees or from 154 to 165 degrees which we call the Tri-septile; but the Promittor Saturn was in quartile aspect to Venus from 1880 to 1882 when the Dilke Scandal lost him his seat and wrecked his career in 1882.

There is a parallel instance in the case of Mr. Parnell who was born June 28th, 1846. Mercury was 50 degrees from Venus which is the Septile aspect, but in Sesqui-quadrate to Saturn and Neptune; Venus was in quartile aspect to Saturn, the Sun was in quartile aspect to Uranus and in Semi-demi-quartile to Mars. From 1887 to 1890 Venus was in Sesqui-quadrate to Saturn, the Promittor which blasted his career, for Parnell was co-respondent in the divorce suit of Captain O'Shea in 1890. The scandal closed his Parliamentary career and he never seemed to survive his political death; he died on October 6th, 1891 when the Sun came within orb the quartile aspect of Mars.

We have observed in thousands of cases that when Venus forms a subsequent bad aspect to the Promittors Mars, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune love-affairs have coincided, but unless one of the malefics or Venus is in the ascendant or Meridian scandal does not always coincide.

We have found that the Semi-demi-quartile aspects of these promittors to Venus are as disastrous as the opposition and the quartile. Such aspects in the horoscopes of females are fraught

with peril, for women have to fear deception at the hands of the other sex.

Sir Starr Jameson was born February 9th, 1853. The Sun was in conjunction with Mars and in semi-demi-square with Neptune. He led the raid on the Transvaal Republic in December, 1895. The battle of Krugersdorp, January 1st, 1896, surrendered to Boers January 2nd, 1896 when the Sun reached the Semi-square of the Promittor Mars and the Semi-demi-square of the Promittor Neptune. In May, 1896, he was sentenced to 10 months imprisonment, but released in December owing to ill-health.

MAN, AN INSTRUMENT OF THE STARS.

A man under no adverse Star Courses may lose his life under the following circumstances: If he is an employée or passenger on a ship, which is at sea when the Captain (or other officers) in command is under brooding stars menacing his life, because a captain under brooding stars may lose his life and the lives of his men and passengers. A man under brooding stars is not only in personal danger, but is a source of danger to his fellows. The man under adverse Star Courses should temporarily relinquish his position since its retention endangers the lives of his compeers.

A Pilot ran his ship on to the Goodwin Sands and he was under the adverse influence of the Promittor Uranus. Those, therefore, who commit themselves to the care of any person (be he the driver of an engine of a passenger train, or the man in charge of a ship, an air craft or aeroplane) subject themselves to the fortunes of the man in command. If his Stars in their Courses are propitious he will carry in safety those in his custody; but if his Stars are brooding, then their own as well as his life are imperilled. These remarks are applicable to those who bring themselves to close proximity to the man whose Stars threaten his life.
